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## **Arab World for Research & Development**

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## **One: Main Results**

- Widespread doubts about the upcoming international meeting at Annapolis, where 45% believe that nothing will actually change as a result, while 14% believe that the meeting will only reinforce the occupation.
- 53% believe that President Abbas cares for the opinions of the public regarding the Annapolis meeting.
- 57% support and 14% (support to some extent) a solution based on twostates according to UN resolution 242.
- 74% support a solution based on the return of most refugees to the West Bank and Gaza and others to the 1948 proper (Israel).
- About 70% feel that negotiations are the best means to achieve national goals.
- 50% describe the performance of Hanneyeh's cabinet as (week), compared with 36% who describe the performance of the President's Office as (week).
- Fayyad's cabinet receives higher evaluations in all fields compared with that
  of Hanneyeh. But both cabinets get almost equal scores in the field of
  achieving personal and collective security.
- 66% evaluate the performance of Hanneyh's cabinet in improving economic conditions as (week), this compared with 28% who describe the performance of Fayyad's cabinet in the same field as (week).
- If election took place on the day of the poll, Fatch might receive 40% or more, and Hamas might receive 15% or more, as over one third of the respondents are either (undecided) or say that they will not vote.
- Abbas, Fayyad or Marwan Bargouti could win over Hanneyeh in a presidential election (with at least 25 points more).
- 72% feel that the gap between Gaza and the West Bank is increasing.
- 35% say that Fatch is more capable in leading the Palestinian society, while 12% say that Hamas is more capable. In contrast about 50% say that neither party is capable of doing that.
- 71% feel that Palestinian society is going in the wrong direction.

## Two: Analysis of results:

## Section One: International Meeting

The President of the United States, Mr. George Bush had called for the convening of an international meeting on Middle-East peace, with a focus on Israeli-Palestinian issues. This meeting is planned to be convened during November of 2007. Palestinians were asked to express their views on the various aspects of this planned meeting.

### **Expectations**

- When asked about their expectations, the results revealed a high degree of skepticism, where about 46% of the respondents believe that the planned international meeting will change nothing on the ground.
- In addition, about 23% of the respondents believe that the meeting will result in an agreement that results in easing up the living conditions.
- Furthermore, about 14% expect negative results, where the meeting will lead to the reinforcement of occupation according to them.
- A small minority (10%) expects that the parties will reach a peace treaty that will deal with all final status issues, as a result of the meeting.
- In regards to this question, there was a higher degree of optimism in Gaza compared with the West Bank, where about 14% of the Gaza sample said that the meeting might result in a peace treaty, compared with 7% in among West Bank respondents.

### **The Negotiations Team**

Palestinians were divided on the Palestinian team responsible for the negotiations.

- About 23% trust that President Abbas and his team are capable of making achievements in relation to national demands. One third believes that (to an extent); while about 40% believe that the President and his team are incapable of brining about achievements. Again, the Gaza respondents are more trusting.
- These views are coupled with the fact that 42% of the respondents feel that President Abbas does not care about the opinions of his people in making his decisions related to the international meeting. This is compared to about 32% who feel that he cares.
- It was interesting to notice that about 47% of the respondents support President Abbas's appointment of Mr. Ahmad Qurei to head the negations team. In contrast, about 37% oppose this appointment.
- In relation to the position of the preparedness of Arab countries, only 26% feel that Arab countries are prepared for the meeting. In comparison, 42% feel that they are not prepared.
- At the same time, about 41% said that they have information on the meeting, and 20% said that they have some information. This does not really indicate how much information and the quality of this information. In addition, about 38% said that they have no information on the meeting.
- This is partly due to the performance of the PA institutions according to the respondents, where about 57% said that PA institutions are not providing the public with information on the planned meeting.

## Section Two: Negotiations & Final Settlement

When the respondents were asked about the final settlement for the conflict, they provided the following answers:

#### **A Two-State Solution**

- The majority (71%) supported (or supported to an extent) a two-state solution based on the UN resolution 242 (a Palestinian state in the West Bank and Gaza side by side with Israel).
- There was no significant difference between Gaza and West Bank in this regard.

## Refugees

• The majority (75%) of the respondents support (or support to an extent) a solution of the refugee problem that is based on allowing the return of the majority of refugees to the West Bank and Gaza, and some refugees to the 1948 proper (Israel).

#### Jerusalem

• 40% of the respondents support (or support to an extent) a solution based on dividing the holy city with Palestinian control of the East side and Israeli control of the West side, with the possibility of exchanging areas from each side. It was noticeable that 58% oppose (oppose to an extent) this scenario.

#### **Settlements**

• About 48% of the respondents oppose the scenario that stipulates dismantling the majority of settlements, and allowing an exchange of land to allow for annexation of some settlements into Israel in exchange for land from the 1948 proper given to the Palestinian side. In contrast, 39% support such a scenario.

## **Negotiations & Co-existence**

- A majority of 70% supports negotiations as the best means to resolve the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, whereas, 31% oppose this statement.
- When asked if the Palestinians and Israelis could live side by side within two independent states, 30% said (yes) and 24% said (yes to an extent). In contrast, 44% said that the two people can't live side by side.

## Section Three: Evaluation of Institutions and Leaders

#### Institutions

- The results show that the evaluation of the President's office and the Ministerial cabinet headed by Mr. Salam Fayyad receive higher scores than the cabinet headed by Mr. Ismael Hanneyeh.
- About 30% described the performance of the President's office as (good), 36% described it as (weak).
- About 34% described the performance of the cabinet headed by Salam Fayyad as (good), and 30% as (weak).
- In contrast, 25% described the performance of Hanneyeh's cabinet as (good), compared with 50% who said that its performance as (week).

- Concerning the performance of the security agencies, only 23% described it as (good, while 42% described it as weak.
- The lowest evaluation went to the courts, where only 19% described their performance as (good), with 47% describing their performance as (weak).

## Fayyad's & Hanneyeh's Cabinets

- Fayyad receives higher evaluations, compared with Hanneyeh, in the fields of improving living conditions, providing services, providing job opportunities, improving institutions and transparency.
- By a very small margin, Hanneyeh receives a better evaluation than Fayyad in the areas of achieving personal and community security.
- They also receive similar scores in the area of ending the occupation.

#### Leaders

- Both Abbas and Fayyad receive a higher evaluation compared with Hanneyeh. About 38% and 37% evaluated the performance of Abbas and Fayyad respectively as (good). About 29% described the performance of Abbas as (weak), while 25% described Fayyad's performance as (weak).
- In contrast, about 28% described Hanneyeh's performance as (good), and 46% as (weak).

### Section Four: Elections and Political Support

### **Election System**

• President Abbas approved a decree to change the election system from a mixed one (proportional on national basis and simple majority in all districts) to a fully proportional system where all lists will have to run on a national basis. This decree receives the support of 62% of the respondents, while 36% oppose the change.

### **Support for Elections**

- A majority (73%) supports carrying out a presidential election as soon as possible, compared with 28% who oppose.
- A similar majority (73%) supports carrying out a legislative election as soon as possible, while 27% oppose.

## **Voting for Lists**

- Fatch receives 40% of the vote in a legislative council election. In Gaza Fatch receives higher support (46%) than the West Bank (37%).
- Hamas's popularity had greatly declined from the day of the last election (January 2006) where it received 44% of the vote, to 15% in both regions at this time. One must however notice that at least one third of the respondents say that they are either undecided (14%) or say that they will not vote (20%). These groups made a significant difference in the final voting outcome during the 2006 election in way of hidden support for Hamas. At this time, these groups need to be further studied to understand their voting potential.

- The lists of Martyr Abu Ali Mustafa (affiliated with PFLP) and Independent Palestine (with AlMubadarah) receive more than 3% each.
- All other groups receive insignificant results.

## **Voting for President**

## 10-Way Race

In a 10-way race that includes 3 Fatch personalities, 3 Hamas personalities, 2 independents, and 2 leftists (PPP and DFLP), Abbas (21%) and Marwan B. (19%) lead the pack. They are closely followed by Hanneyeh (14%), Fayyad and Mustafa B. (at about 5% each). M. Dahalan receives 2.6%, higher than two Hamas candidates (Zahhar and N. AlSha'er). In fact, Dahalan receives about 7% of the Gaza vote, compared with less than 1% for Zahhar. Again, about 30% are either undecided or will not vote.

## **Two-Way Races**

- Abbas receives 47% and wins over Hanneyeh who receives 22%.
- Fayyad receives 44% and wins over Hanneyeh who receives 25%.
- Marwan B. receives 53% and wins over Hanneyeh who receives 20%.
